Jubilees on both sides of the 12 year regency after Amaziah and the 24 year interregnum after Jeroboam II confirm the Scripture and its straightforward interpretation.

Then all the people of Judah took Azariah, when he be a son of sixteen years. Then they made him king under his father Amaziah. 2 Kings 14:21.

In the twenty and seventh year of Jeroboam king of Israel began Azariah son of Amaziah king of Judah to reign. 2 Kings 15:1.

Uzziah ruled as a junior regent under Jeroboam II until Jeroboam II died. Jeroboam II never wanted to take over Judah. He only wanted to defend the two kingdoms against foreign aggression.

Elath destroyed by earthquake, and many other cities.

Jeroboam II let Uzziah rebuild Elath. The town was returned to Judah when he died.

Then rests Jeroboam with his fathers, with the kings of Israel. Then reigns Zachariah under him. 2 Kings 14:29.

Jeroboam allowed Uzziah to come to the throne and make Judah independent again. This may not have sat well with other factions in Israel who wanted to take over Judah and feared Uzziah's strength growing tremendously. A crisis over the succession arose threatening the fourth generation prophecy.

A Assyria is overthrown by a Chaldean, Pul, a separate king from Tiglath-Pileser III according to the Hebrew text of 1 Chron. 5:26, who made himself king of Assyria, ruling the cities of the country by extortion, plunder, tribute and tax, and fair-weather vassals. The Assyrian administrative state collapsed as a result, and economic texts were produced without reference to eponyms, since none were appointed by Pul. Pul also managed an expedition to Israel to extort tribute from Menahem, also as retribution for the attack on Tipsach on the Euphrates. Pul began to deport the Transjordan population, possibly to weaken the Assyrian lords with a foreign population in their midst. But later Tiglath-Pileser III adopted this policy for his own reasons, because he also needed weak governors, since he wanted to restore a strong Assyrian administrative state under himself. Tiglath-Pileser III usurped Pul's legacy by claiming it as his own, a clever form of *dammatio memoriae*, and then directing his scribes to concatenate the previous eponym lists with his own.

The term *interregnum* is only with respect to the rule of Jehu's dynasty for the sake of the 4th generation prophecy. Somebody(s) governed Israel at this point, perhaps not having the status of king, but only having the support of the people. Scripture passes over the period in silence. Whoever governed did not follow Yahweh, since these years make up part of the 390 years of iniquity.
